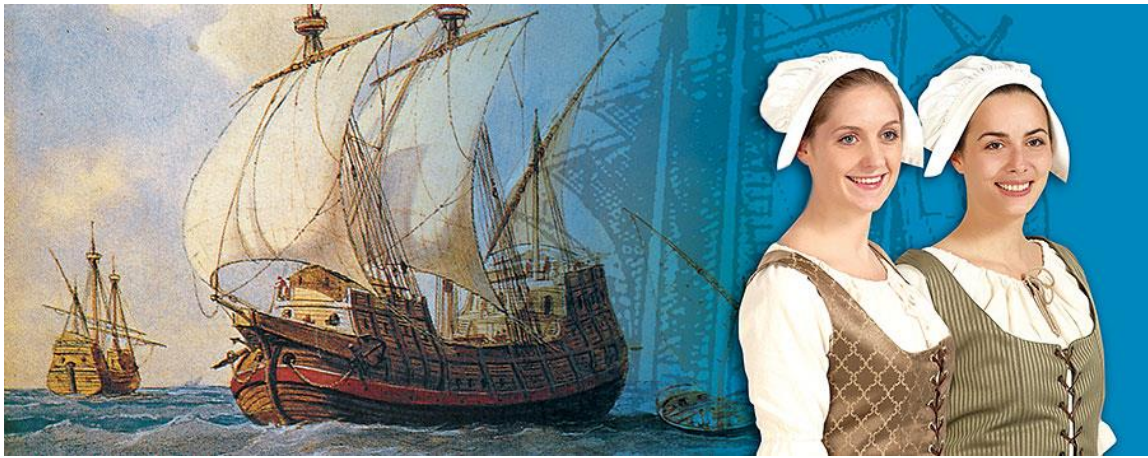


Filles du Roi – Part 1 – Marguerite Abraham to Hélène Bonneau

FCHSM's list of the *Filles du Roi* can help members identify and research their *Filles du Roi* ancestors so that they can participate in the FCHSM Chart Program (see page 20 for a description of this program) as well as write stories about their ancestors that could be submitted for publication in *MHH*. Our list of the *Filles du Roi* is based on Peter J. Gagné, *King's Daughters and Founding Mothers: The Filles du Roi, 1663-1673* (Quintin Publications: Pawtucket, Rhode Island, 2001); genealogical information and name standardization is based on René Jetté, *Dictionnaire généalogique des familles du Québec des origines à 1730* (Montréal: Les Presses de l'Université de Montréal: 1983). The annotations provide basic marriage information regarding the *Filles du Roi* and their husbands. Additionally, the annotations have been specifically tailored to provide the following historical information related to the Richelieu Valley, Great Lakes, and the Mississippi Valley: 1. if the *Fille du Roi* married a member of the Carignan Salières Regiment, the name of his Company is noted; 2. details have been provided for those *Filles du Roi* whose husbands or children were involved in the fur trade as *engagés*, *engageurs*, or *voyageurs* during the 17th century and early part of the 18th century. A number of the couples listed below had daughters who married men who were involved in the fur trade, but in order to keep this series of articles to a reasonable length, information on the daughters and their spouses are not included in the annotations.¹ Additional genealogical and biographical information can be found in Gagné and Jetté; if Gagné's biography contains biographical information that extends beyond genealogical information found in Jetté, I have noted that fact with an asterisk before the *Fille du Roi's* name. Although a number of internet sites² list the *Filles du Roi*, the information provided is limited to basic marriage information.

- Marguerite Abraham**, daughter of Godgaut Abraham and Denise Fleury, married **Ozanie Joseph Nadeau dit Lavigne**, son of Maçia Nadeau and Jeanne Despins, *circa* 6 November 1665 possibly on Île d'Orléans (date of marriage contract). After his death on 10 February 1677, Marguerite married **Guillaume Chartier**, son of Olivier Chartier and Marie Cornet, 31 January 1678 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans [Gagné, p. 43; Jetté, pp. 235-236, 844].
- Anne Adam**, daughter of Corneille Adam and Michelle de la Court, married **Jean Poliquin**, son of Jean Poliquin and Catherine Cavrain, 7 November 1671 in Québec. After her death, Jean Poliquin married Louise Ledran [Gagné, pp. 43-44; Jetté, p. 934].
- Marie Anne Agathe**, daughter of Sébastien Agathe and Catherine LaCarrière, married **Laurent Armand**, son of Jean Armand and Marie Marié, 16 October 1663 in Québec. After Marie Anne's death, Laurent Armand married Marie Constantineau [Gagné, p. 44; Jetté, p. 19].
- Marie Albert**, daughter of François Albert and Thomasse Gabarret, married **Jean Chauveau dit Lafleur**, son of Daniel Chauveau and Marie Caga, 29 October 1663 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 44-45; Jetté, p. 241].
- Marie Allence**, daughter of Jean Allence and Louise de Bremeuil or Bramanle, married **Louis Tardif**, son of Jean Tardif and Michelle Villain, *circa* 13 November 1669 in Trois-Rivières (date of contract) [Gagné, p. 45; Jetté, p. 1063].
- Jeanne Amiot**, daughter of Noël Amiot and Anne Vivienne, married **Nicolas Pion dit Lafontaine**, son of Nicolas Pion and Catherine Bredons, 19 September 1673 in Québec. After Nicolas Pion's death, Jeanne Amiot married **François Chicoine**, son of Pierre Chicoine and Madeleine Chrétien, 12 November 1704 in Contrecoeur. On 10 July 1703, the *Compagnie de la Colonie* hired **François Chicoine** to make a voyage to Détroit [Gagné, p. 46; Jetté, pp. 250, 923; *RAPQ*, p. 208].
- Françoise Ancelin**, daughter of Gilles Ancelin and Catherine Clément, married **Guillaume Valade** or Vallade, son of André Valade and Sarah Cousseau, 10 November 1669 in Québec. After Françoise's death, Guillaume Valade married Jeanne Chalut, widow of Joachim Girard [Gagné, pp. 46-47; Jetté, p. 1107].
- Louise André**, daughter of Étienne André and Adrienne Taillou, married **Nicolas Bossu dit LePrince**, son of André Bossu and Nicole Bresme, 18 January 1672 in Boucherville [Gagné, pp. 47-48; Jetté, p. 131].
- Marguerite Andrieu**, daughter of Guillaume Andrieu and Anne Couillart, married **Pierre Augran dit Lapierre**, son of Jean Augran and Audine Robisca, 19 September 1673 in Québec. Pierre Augran dit Lapierre was a soldier in the Desportes Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment [Gagné, p. 48; Jetté, p. 33].
- Marie Angelier** married **Vivien Rochereau** before 17 March 1670 (date of contract). The names of their parents are not known [Gagné, pp. 48-49; Jetté, p. 1101].
- Denise Anthoine**, daughter of François Anthoine and Guillemette Piro, married **Laurent Buy dit Lavergne**, son of Pierre Buy and Marie Françoise Unknown, *circa* 11 October 1670 in Champlain (date of contract). Laurent Buy was a soldier in the St. Ours Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. After Laurent's death, Denise married **Mathurin Banlier dit Laperle**, widower of Françoise Vernin, *circa* 1690 in St-Ours. The names of his parents are unknown [Gagné, pp. 49-50; Jetté, pp. 43, 186].
- Marie Arcular**, daughter of Jean Arcular and Catherine Coin, married **Claude Lefebvre dit Boulange**, son of Louis Lefebvre and Marie Verneuil, 28 October 1669 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans. After Claude's death, Marie married **Pierre Lejamble**, son of Jean Lejamble and Françoise Hébert, 7 July 1692 in St-François, Île d'Orléans [Gagné, pp. 50-51; Jetté, pp. 687, 702].
- Marguerite Ardion**, widow of Laurent Beaudet, married **Jean Rabouin**, son of François Rabouin and Marguerite Chassay, 28 October 1663 in Québec. After Marguerite's death, Jean Rabouin married Marguerite Leclerc, widow of Nicolas Leblond, and Marie Mineau, widow of Jean Morier [Gagné, pp. 51-52; Jetté, p. 958].
- Anne Arinart**, daughter of Geoffrey Arinart and Marie Bremont, married **Jean Réal or Réart**, son of Thomas Réal and Marie Mondain, 20 October 1671 at Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans. After Jean's death, Anne married **Antoine Lefort**, son of Jean Lefort and Perrine Gravel and widower of Marie Doyon, 9 February 1678 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans [Gagné, p. 52; Jetté, pp. 694, 970].
- Marie Ariot**, daughter of Bernardin Ariot and Marguerite Deli or Dely, married **René Vandet**, son of René Vandet and Andrée Ligouneresse, 11 April 1671 in Québec [Gagné, p. 53; Jetté, p. 1113].
- Fluerance Asserin** came to New France in 1667, but never married and probably returned to France [Gagné, p. 53].
- ***Françoise Aubé**, daughter of Pierre Aubé and Françoise Périé, married **Michel Roy dit Châtellerault**, son of Michel Roy and Louise Chevalier, 8 October 1668 in Québec. Michel Roy was soldier in the Lanoraie Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. In 1689, **Michel Roy** formed a partnership with Robert Rivard dit Loranger.

- The partners entered into a trading agreement with the *Compagnie du Nord* for the trading rights to the area of Lakes Abitibi and Témiscamingue, but Michel did not take an active role as a trader. All three of their sons (**Edmond Roy**, **Michel Roy**, and **Pierre Roy**) were part of the initial convoy to Détroit. **Pierre Roy** returned to Détroit as part of the 10 July 1703 convoy. On 25 April 1704, **Michel Roy** agreed to return to Détroit. **Edmond Roy** was part of the 28 July 1704 and 30 May 1705 convoys [Gagné, pp. 53-54 – includes information regarding the 1689 trading partnership; Jetté, p. 1018; *RAPQ*, pp. 205-206 – initial convoy, 208 – 1703 convoy, 209 – 1704 contracts, 210 – 1705 contract].
- Élisabeth Aubert**, daughter of Michel Aubert and Jeanne Aubert, married **Aubin Lambert dit Champagne**, son of Odoard Lambert and Jacqueline Feillard, 29 September 1670 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 54-55; Jetté, p. 637].
- Jeanne Aubert**, daughter of Pierre Aubert and Judith Aumont, married **Jean Bisson dit Provençal**, son of Jean Bisson and Catherine Lamarmette, *circa* 20 October 1669 in Trois-Rivières (date of contract). After Jean's death, Jeanne married **Joseph (de) Morache** *circa* 1676 in Champlain. Joseph's origins and the names of his parents are unknown [Gagné, p. 55; Jetté, pp. 107, 827].
- Marguerite d'Aubigny**, daughter of François d'Aubigny and Antoinette LeCoq, married **Charles Daveau dit Laplante**, son of Denis Daveau and Renée Hardouin, 19 September 1673 in Québec [Gagné, p. 174; Jetté, p. 311].
- Suzanne Aubineau**, widow of Pierre Auclair, married **Mathias Campagna**, son of Mathurin Campagna and Jacquette Suire, *circa* 25 April 1667 on Île d'Orléans (date of contract) [Gagné, pp. 55-56; Jetté, p. 194].
- Anne Aubry** married **Antoine Caillé dit Brûlefer and Biscornet** *circa* 1674 in Laprairie. The names of their parents are unknown [Gagné, p. 56; Jetté, p. 191].
- Françoise Aubry**, daughter of Louis Aubry and Julienne Juchel or Juhel, married **Antoine Mercier dit Lépine**, son of Jean Mercier and Jeanne Carvais, 25 September 1673 in Québec. After Antoine Mercier's death, Françoise Aubry married **Vincent Châtigny dit Lépine** *circa* 1676. His origins and the names of his parents are unknown [Gagné, p. 56-57; Jetté, pp. 239, 798].
- Jacqueline Aubry**, daughter of Marin Aubry and Anne Leroux, married **Antoine Gros or Legros dit Laviolette**, son of Jean Gros and Marguerite Aupy, 9 September 1670 in Québec. Antoine Gros was a soldier in the LaVarenne Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. Jacqueline and Antoine's sons Nicolas and Jean Baptiste Gros were *engagés*. On 30 May 1705, **Nicolas Gros** was part of the convoy to Détroit. On 6 June 1710, he was part of a group of *voyageurs* who agreed to return to Détroit. On 6 September 1708, **Jean Baptiste Gros** was one of four *voyageurs* who agreed to travel to Détroit in a canoe belonging to Barbe Loisel. After Antoine Gros' death, Jacqueline Aubry married **Guillaume Denoyon**, son of Jean Denoyon and Jeanne Franchart, or Francfort, 22 March 1689 in Lachine [Gagné, pp. 57-58; Jetté, pp. 335, 531; *MNR*, Vol. 2, 499-550 – Jean Baptiste Gros' voyage to Détroit, 565-566 – Nicolas Gros' 1710 voyage to Détroit; *RAPQ*, p. 210 – Nicolas Gros' 1705 contract].
- Catherine Auger** was the daughter of Nicolas Auger and Marie Masson or Chasson. She didn't marry in New France and returned to France [Gagné, p. 58].
- Jeanne Auger**, daughter of Savinien Auger and Marie Ruelle, married **Sébastien Nolet dit Larivière**, son of Vincent Nolet and Jeanne Martel, 26 October 1671 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 58-59; Jetté, pp. 851-852].
- Isabelle Aupé**, daughter of Charles Aupé and Catherine Hubert, married **Pierre (de) Lavoie or Lavoye**, son of Pierre Lavoie and Élisabeth Vadois, and widower of Jacquette Grinon, *circa* 25 August 1670 (date of contract) [Gagné, pp. 59-60; Jetté, p. 667].
- Madeleine Auvray**, daughter of Antoine Auvray and Marie LeNormand, married **Nicolas Matte**, son of Charles Matte and Barbe Harache, 12 October 1671 in Québec [Gagné, p. 60; Jetté, p. 789].
- Antoinette Bagau de Beurenom**, daughter of Guillaume Bagau and Françoise LePoupet, married **Pierre Roberge dit Lacroix**, son of Jacques Roberge and Claudine Buret, 22 October 1672 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans. After Antoinette Bagau's death, Pierre married Marie Lefrançois [Gagné, p. 61; Jetté, pp. 992-993].
- ***Catherine (de) Baillon**, daughter of Alphonse (de) Baillon and Louise de Marle, married **Jacques Miville**, son of Pierre Miville and Charlotte Maugis, 12 November 1669 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 174-175; Jetté, pp. 817-818].
- Madeleine Bailly**, daughter of Guillaume Bailly and Barbe Seillier, married **Guillaume Vanier dit Lafontaine**, son of Pierre Vanier and Jacqueline Gaillard, 5 July 1672 in Québec. After Guillaume's death, Madeleine married **Joseph Fernando** 27 September 1697 in Charlesbourg. The names of Joseph's parents are not known [Gagné, pp. 61-62; Jetté, pp. 416, 1113].
- Françoise Baiselat**, daughter of Benjamin Baiselat and Claude Prou, married **Laurent Cambin dit Larivière**, son of Denis Cambin and Perette Caillot or Caillaud, 16 August 1668 in Québec. Laurent Cambin was a sergeant in the DuGué Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. After Laurent Cambin's death, Françoise married **Pierre François Marsan dit Lapierre**, son of Jean Marsan and Jacqueline de Vincent, 22 September 1670 in

- Québec, François Marsan was a sergeant in the Chambly Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. Françoise Baiselat and Pierre François Marsan's son **Jean Marsan** was part of the 30 May 1705 convoy to Détroit. After Pierre François Marsan's death, Françoise married **André Corbeil or Gourbeil dit Tranchemontagne**, son of Jean Corbeil and Marie Bernard, 4 April 1693 in Pointe aux Trembles [Gagné, pp. 62-63] (states that Corbeil was a member of the Carignan Salières Regiment, but Jetté states he was a soldier in Crisafy Company. The Crisafy Company was not part of the Carignan Salières Regiment; the Crisafy Company came to New France at a later date; Jetté, pp. 193, 269, 775; *RAPQ*, p. 210).
- Catherine Ballié**, daughter of Guillaume Ballié and Adrienne Tané or Tassé, married **Pierre Bouvier**, son of Sébastien Bouvier and Jeanne Leconflète, 24 November 1667 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 63-64; Jetté, p. 160].
- Marie Anne Bamont**, daughter of Jean Bamont and Marie Lumon, married **Vincent Morisseau**, son of Pierre Morisseau and Marie Guillebonne, *circa* 23 October 1673 (date of contract). Four of their sons were *engagés*. On 9 June 1695 Jean Maillot hired **Jean Morisseau** for a voyage to the 8ta8ois (Ottawa Indians). **Jean Baptiste Morisseau** was part of the 16 May 1702 convoy to Détroit. Cadillac hired him to go to Détroit on 15 June 1706. Cadillac also hired **Louis Morisseau** to go to Détroit on 15 June 1706. **Pierre Morisseau's** first voyage as an *engagé* took place in 1699 when Jean Boudor hired him to go to Michilimackinac. Pierre Morisseau was part of the original convoy to Détroit; he returned to Détroit as part of the 16 July 1702, 28 July 1704, and 30 May 1705 convoys [Gagné, p. 64; Jetté, p. 838; *RAPQ*, pp. 204 – 1695, 205-206 – 1701, 207 – 1702, 209 – 1704, 201 – 1705, 210 – 15 June 1706 – mistakenly calls Jean Baptiste Morisseau Jacques Morisseau, 210 – Louis Morisseau's 15 June 1706 contract; *Edge of Empire*, pp. 128-130, 131-133 – Pierre Morisseau's 1699 voyage to Michilimackinac].
- Françoise Banse**, daughter of Jacques Banse and Catherine Briart, married **Jacques Prou or Leprou**, son of Étienne Prou and Marie Leroux, 4 October 1667 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 64-65; Jetté, p. 949].
- Marie Barbant**, daughter of Alexandre Barbant and Marie LeNoble, married **Jean (de) Lalonde dit Lespérance**, son of Philippe (de) Lalonde and Jeanne Duval, *circa* 14 November 1669 (date of contract). Two of their sons were *engagés*. On 2 September 1696, Cadillac hired **Jean Baptiste (de) Lalonde** to make a voyage to the Ottawa. On 3 July 1717, Jacques Arrivé hired **Guillaume (de) Lalonde** to make a voyage to the *pays d'en haut*. After Jean (de) Lalonde's death, Marie Barbant married **Pierre Tabault**, son of Jean Barbant and Marie Morin, and widower of Jean Françoise Roy. Pierre Tabault was a member of the Contrecoeur Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. Although Marie Barbant and Pierre Tabault were childless, Jean Tabault and Pierre Tabault his sons by Jeanne Françoise Roy were *engagés* [Gagné, pp. 65-66; Jetté, pp. 634, 1060; *RAPQ*, pp. 205 – 1696, 222 – 1717].
- Jeanne Barbereau** married **Jacques Arrivé** between 1666 and 1667 on Île d'Orléans. The names of their parents are unknown. Their son **Joseph Arrivé** was an *engagé* on 2 May 1716; he was hired by Toussaint Dardenne to make a voyage to Michilimackinac [Gagné, p. 66; Jetté, p. 21; *RAPQ*, p. 219. The Jacques Arrivé who was an *engagé* and an *engageur* was a different man than Jeanne's husband].
- Françoise Barberry**, daughter of Rollin Barberry and Michelle Mingroy or Negresse, married **René Dardenne**, son of Pierre Dardenne and Gillette Chaigne, 12 November 1668 in Montréal. Their son **Toussaint Dardenne** was an *engagé*. On 28 May 1702, Joseph Fleury hired Jean Gabriel Picard, Pierre Lelac, **Toussaint Dardenne**, and Jean Baptiste Jarry to make a voyage to Fort Frontenac. **Toussaint Dardenne** was part of the 28 July 1704 convy to Détroit. On 12 May 1707, Jean Jacques Leber, a Montréal merchant, hired Pierre Robert and Joseph Robert, *frères* of Boucherville, **Toussaint Dardenne**, and Jean Lesieur, of Montréal, to transport merchandise to René Louis Fournier *sieur* Dufiguier, an officer in Détroit. On 13 May 1707, Pierre Robert and Joseph Robert, *frères* of Boucherville, and **Toussaint Dardenne**, associates of Jean Lesieur on the voyage that they were about to make to Détroit, acknowledged that Jean Lesieur contributed 97 *livres*, 9 *sols* for the canoe and tobacco that they would take to Détroit. On 1 October 1708, Toussaint Pothier *dit* Laverdure, Jacques Filiatrault, **Toussaint Dardenne**, and Jean Baptiste Trudeau, *habitants* of Détroit, declared to François Ardouin, acting for Antoine *de* Lamothe Cadillac that they would transport merchandise to Cadillac in Détroit and return to Montréal with furs. On 7 October 1708, Pierre de Lestage, acting for Antoine Pacaud, recorded an obligation from Jacques Filiatrault, of Lachine, Toussaint Pothier *dit* Laverdure, **Toussaint Dardenne**, of Montréal, and Jean Baptiste Trudeau, of Longueuil, for 2,222 *livres* for merchandise and equipment for their voyage to Détroit. On 18 April 1710, Antoine *de* Lestage, a Montréal merchant acting for Antoine Pacaud, recorded an obligation from Toussaint Pothier *dit* Laverdure, of Montréal, Jacques Filiatrault, of Lachine, acting for themselves and for **Toussaint Dardenne**, their associate, for 1,254 *livres*, 5 *sols*, for merchandise and equipment for their voyage to Détroit. Cadillac granted **Toussaint Dardenne** a lot in the fort on 20 March 1708; in addition he agreed to pay for a priest on 7 June 1710 and was listed on the first census of Détroit taken during 1710 [Gagné, pp. 66-67; Jetté, pp. 307-308; *RAPQ*, p. 207 – 1702, 209 – 1704; *MNR*, Vol. 2, p. 441 – 12 May 1707, mistakenly states that

- his name was Toussaint Dandonneau, p. 441 – 13 May 1707, mistakenly states that his name was Toussaint Dandonneau, pp. 504-506 – 1 October 1708, pp. 508-509 – 7 October 1708, pp. 547-548 – 18 April 1710; “List of *habitants du détroit* Who, on 7 June 1710, Agreed to Pay for a Priest” – transcribed and annotated by Gail Moreau-DesHarnais; “Census du *Détroit de Pontchartrain* for the year 1710” – Gail Moreau-DesHarnais, *Michigan's Habitant Heritage*, Vol. 26 #4, October 2005; LAC, Mikan #2487406 – Land grant].
- Jeanne Barbier**, daughter of Guillaume Barbier and Liesse Walbert, married **Julien Plumereau dit Latreille**, whose parents and origin are unknown, *circa* 3 November 1670 (date of contract). After Julien Plumereau's death, Jeanne married **François Blain or Abelin**, son of Mathurin Blain and Suzanne Crolet or Courelle, 7 January 1681 in Contrecoeur. Their son **Pierre Blain** was an *engagé*; on 16 April 1712; Jean Baptiste Forestier hired Pierre Blain to make a voyage to Détroit [Gagné, p. 67; Jetté, pp. 112, 929; *RAPQ*, p. 213].
- Anne Bardet or Bardé**, daughter of Philippe Bardet and Antoinette Desgands, married **Jean Paulin**, son of Pierre Paulin and Thomasse Clerguille, *circa* 5 October 1665 (date of contract) [Gagné, pp. 68-69; Jetté, p. 883].
- Marie Louise Bardou**, daughter of César Bardou and Élisabeth Leclerc, married **Mathurin Drouet dit Grandmaison**, son of François Drouet and Marie Haressepied, 30 September 1669 in Québec [Gagné, p. 69; Jetté, p. 362].
- ***Marie Baril**, daughter of Jules Baril and Madeleine Boeslo, married **François Sauvin dit Larose**, son of Jean Sauvin and Madeleine Malevault, 13 October 1670 in Québec. In 1679, **François Sauvin dit Larose** agreed to work for one year as a ship's carpenter for René Robert Cavelier, *sieur* de La Salle, at Fort Frontenac. Following his return to Québec at the end of August 1680, he was forced to sue La Salle for 15 months of service at 600 *livres* per year [Gagné, pp. 69-70; Jetté, pp. 1037-1038].
- Anne Barillet**, daughter of Jean Barillet and Anne Boudinnier, married **Guy Vacher**, son of Guillaume Vacher and Guillemette Vissonneau, 9 November 1671 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 70-71; Jetté, p.1104].
- Barbe Baron**, daughter of Jacques Baron and Françoise Ruibel, married **Simon Chevreux dit La Taupine**, son of Pierre Chevreux and Catherine Bonneau, 3 November 1667 in Québec. After Simon Chevreux's death, Barbe married **Jean Mérienne dit LaSolaye or LaSaulaye**, son of Jean Mérienne and Michelle Rouiller, 2 May 1672 in Québec. Jean Mérienne was a soldier in Grandfontaine Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. After Jean Mérienne's death, Barbe married **Guillaume Duboc dit Saint Godard**, son of Alexandre Duboc and Madeleine Cretel, 23 April 1691 in Québec. After Barbe Baron's death, Guillaume Duboc married Marie Catherine Renaud and Marie Madeleine Lépinay [Gagné, pp. 71-72; Jetté, pp. 249, 366, 801].
- Catherine Barré** (1), daughter of Jacques Barré and Françoise Gauvrte, married **Mathurin Chaillé**, son of Jean Chaillé and Jeanne Bouillaut, 11 January 1665 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 72-73; Jetté, p. 216].
- Catherine Barré** (2), daughter of Jean Barré and Marie Epy, married **Nicolas Roy**, son of Nicolas Roy and Madeleine Leter, 22 October 1663. The couple returned to France in 1665 Gagné, p. 73; Jetté, p. 1018].
- Françoise Marthe Barton**, daughter of Philippe Barton and Renée Pestre, married **Joseph Chevalier**, son of Jean Chevalier and Madeleine Leureux, October 1670 in Montréal. Their son **Jean Baptiste Chevalier** was an *engageur* and merchant *voyageur* who lived with his wife Marie Françoise Alavoine at Michilimackinac in the 18th century [Gagné, pp. 73-74; Jetté, pp. 246, 247-248; *DCB*, biography of Jean Baptiste Chevalier].
- ***Catherine Basset**, daughter of Guillaume Basset and Marguerite Carie or Cavé, married **Pierre Bourguoin dit Bourguignon**, son of François Bourguoin and Andrée Bastard, 17 October 1667 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 74-75; Jetté, p. 153].
- ***Anne Baugé**, daughter of Étienne Baugé and Madeleine Choret, married **Guillaume Corruble**, son of Gilles Corruble and Marguerite Ardou, 2 October 1673 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 75-76; Jetté, p. 272].
- Catherine Beaudin**, daughter of Sébastien Beaudin and Hilaire Ledeslié, married **Pierre Coquin dit LaTournelle**, son of René Coquin and Alice Fayel, 12 October 1671 in Québec. Pierre was a soldier in the Grandfontaine Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment [Gagné, pp. 76-77; Jetté, p. 269].
- Étiennette Beaudon**, daughter of Étienne Beaudon and Marguerite Guigné, married **Tugal Cotin or Cottin**, son of René Cotin and Françoise Ménard, 10 January 1672 in Québec. The *Compagnie de la Colonie* hired their sons **Louis Cotin** and **Joseph Cotin** to go to Détroit in 1705. **Louis Cotin** was hired 18 April 1705, and **Joseph Cotin** was hired on 28 April 1705 [Gagné, p. 77; Jetté, p. 276; Louis Chamballon and Antoine Roy, editor, *Inventaire des Greffes des Notaires du Régime Français* (Québec: 1960), Volume 19, pp. 136, 137].
- ***Marie Marguerite Beaugrand**, daughter of Nicolas Beaugrand and Marie Chevalier, and widow of **Sébastien Cousin**, married Claude Marquis or Lemarquis, son of Charles Marquis and Jeanne Bignon, 18 September 1673 in Québec. After Marie Marguerite's death, Claude married Agnès Giguère [Gagné, p. 78; Jetté, p. 774].
- Marie Jeanne Beaujean or Gauchonne** married **Pierre Juin**, possibly son of François Juin and Mathurine Thessereyne and widower of Françoise Lucas, before 1666. The names of her parents are unknown [Gagné, pp. 78-79; Jetté, p. 615].

- ***Marie (de) Beauregard**, daughter of Olivier (de) Beauregard and Philippe Ardouin, married **Sébastien Langelier**, son of Michel Langelier and Catherine Bidaut, 12 November 1665 in Québec. After Sébastien's death she married **Étienne Gélinas**, widower of Huguette Robert, 12 October 1682 in Québec. The names of Étienne's parents and his origins in France are unknown [Gagné, pp. 175-176; Jetté, pp. 483, 644].
- Marthe Beauregard**, daughter of Jean Beauregard and Marie Desmarais, married **Gabriel Lemieux**, son of Louis Lemieux and Marie Lugan, and widower of Marguerite Leboeuf, 26 November 1671 in Québec. Gabriel Lemieux's son by his first wife was an *engagé* during the 17th century. On 14 May 1688, Claude Greysolon de LaTourette recorded an agreement with Jean Chagnos/Chano, Charles Couture, Eustache Couture, **Gabriel Lemieux**, Guay, and Samson regarding a voyage to the Ottawa. On 8 May 1690 Jean Baptiste Migeon, *sieur* de Bransat, hired **Gabriel Lemieux** for a voyage des 8ta8ois (Ottawa Indians). On 19 August 1692 Joachim Germaneau hired **Gabriel Lemieux** and Laurent Glory for a voyage to the 8ta8ois (Ottawa Indians) [Gagné, p. 79; Jetté, p. 708; *MNR*, Vol. 1, pp. 198-199 – 14 May 1688, 246 – 8 May 1690, 270 – 19 August 1692].
- Jeanne Beauveau**, daughter of Julien Beauveau and Catherine Peau, married **Jean Blet dit Gazaille**, son of Pierre Blet and Françoise Jardinier, *circa* 16 April 1674 (date of contract). Jean Blet was a soldier in the St. Ours Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment [Gagné, pp. 79-80; Jetté, p. 116].
- Marie Bellehache**, daughter of Pierre Bellehache and Marie Burelle, married **Gilles Bourret or Bourré dit Lépine**, son of Jean Bourret and Marie Danguy, *circa* 9 September 1673 (date of contract) [Gagné, p. 80; Jetté, p. 154].
- Catherine (de) Belleau or Bellot**, daughter of François (de) Belleau, *sieur* de Contigny, and Anne de Bréda, married **Jean Baptiste Morin, sieur de Rochebelle**, son of Noël Morin and Hélène Desportes, 22 November 1667 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 176-177; Jetté, pp. 834-835].
- Anne Bellesoeur dite Lucas**, daughter of Germain Bellesoeur and Marie Lucas, married **Nicolas Massard**, son of Jean Massard and Marguerite Pimpante, 12 October 1665 in Québec. After Nicolas Massard's death, Anne married **Jean Lambert**, widower of Marie Tartarin, 19 May 1686 in Lauzon. The names of his parents and his origins in France are not known. After Jean Lambert's death, Anne Bellesoeur married **Jean François Chevaudier or Chabaudier dit Lépine**, son of Jacques Chevaudier and Catherine Barilot and widower of Marie Mercier, 14 July 1688 in Québec [Gagné, p. 81; Jetté, pp. 248, 637, 784].
- Jeanne Bénard**, daughter of Rolin Bénard and Gabrielle Vitaille, married **Pierre Gadois**, son of Pierre Gadois and Louise Mauger, 20 April 1665 in Montréal. Pierre Gadois had been previously married to Marie Pontonnier but their marriage had been annulled due to alleged infertility [Gagné, pp. 81-82 Jetté, p. 447].
- Marie Benoît** married **Pierre Favreau or Favereau dit Deslauriers** *circa* 1688 in Contrecoeur. The names of their parents and origins in France are not known. Pierre Favreau was a soldier in the Contrecoeur Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment [Gagné, pp. 82-83; Jetté, p. 414].
- Anne Béraud dite Dubreuil**, daughter of Claude Béraud, *sieur* Dubreuil, and Catherine de Marle, married **Mathieu Jarosson**, son of Jean Jarosson and Jeanne Fournier, 19 June 1674 in Québec [Gagné, p. 83; Jetté, p. 593].
- Louise Bercier**, daughter of Jean Bercier and Marie Morel, married **Michel Feuillon or Fillion**, son of René Feuillon and Mathurine Nicou, *circa* 15 October 1668 (date of contract) [Gagné, pp. 83-84; Jetté, p. 417].
- Marguerite Berger**, daughter of Jean Berger and Madeleine Jeanne, married **Charles Courtois**, son of Antoine Courtois and Esther LeBrun, 9 October 1670 in Québec [Gagné, p. 84; Jetté, p. 285].
- Jeanne Bernard**, daughter of Hugues Bernard and Perrine Destournère, married **Jacques Thuillier dit Desvignets**, son of Jeanne Thuillier and Gillette Louier, 29 April 1669 in Montréal. Their son **Nicolas Thuillier** was an *engagé*. On 17 September 1712, Jacques Langlois hired **Nicolas Thuillier** to make a voyage to Détroit. On 1 July 1719, Pierre de Lestage recorded a debt from **Nicolas Thuillier** and Charles Ferron, *voyageurs*, for 4,967 *livres*, 3 *sols*, 11 *deniers* for the voyage that they were about to take to Lake Superior [Gagné, pp. 84-85; Jetté, p. 1081; *RAPQ*, pp. 214 – 1712, 227 - 1719].
- Marguerite Berrin**, daughter of Pierre Berrin and Louise Amblart, had a *fil naturel* by **Simon François Daumont, sieur de Saint-Lusson**; their son Jean Baptiste was baptized 24 June 1673 in Québec and later adopted by Vincent Poirier. **Dumont** took possession of the area surrounding Sault Ste. Marie 4 June 1671. On 2 July 1675 Marguerite Berrin married **Julien Bouin dit Dufresne**, son of Julien Bouin and Mathurine Bossé. Julien was a soldier in the Saurel/Sorel Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. After Marguerite's death, Julien married Jeanne Rivault, widow of Pierre Doret [Gagné, p. 85; Jetté, pp. 144; *DCB*, Daumont's biography].
- Anne Bertault**, daughter of Jean Bertault and Jeanne Loyne, married **Robert Chartier**, son of Guillaume Chartier and Marguerite Desportes, 21 October 1669 in Québec [Gagné, p. 86; Jetté, p. 235].
- Marie Bertin dite Breval**, daughter of Barthélemi Bertin and Anne Richard, married **Charles Séguin**, son of Nicolas Séguin and Françoise Richarrelles, 3 October 1669 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans. After Charles Séguin's death, Marie married **Pierre Louineau or Luineau**, son of Nicolas Louineau and Louise Borseguine, and widow of Anne Fléchet, 28 April 1678 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans [Gagné, pp. 86-87; Jetté, pp. 745, 1041].

- Marie Besche**, daughter of Emmanuel Besche and Marguerite Jeanne DuTemple, married **Pierre Chaperon**, son of Louis Chaperon and Jeanne Thomas, 19 November 1670 in Boucherville. After Marie's death, Pierre Chaperon married Noëlle Tiremont, widow of Bernard Bertin [Gagné, p. 87; Jetté, p. 224].
- Marie (de) Bérunine** arrived in New France in 1671; but didn't marry and returned to France [Gagné, p. 177].
- Catherine Beuzelinz**, daughter of Mathieu Beuzelinz and Claude Morel married **Jean Lonlabard**, son of Jean Lonlabard and Péronne Allengère, 19 October 1671 [Gagné, pp. 87-88; Jetté, p. 742].
- Marie Madeleine (de) Bidequin**, daughter of Pierre (de) Bidequin and Annonciade Roux, married **Jean Bouvet dit or sieur Lachambre**, son of Jean Bouvet and Suzanne Bodquin 17 October 1673 in Québec. Jean Bouvet was a surgeon in the St. Ours Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment [Gagné, pp. 177-178; Jetté, p. 160].
- Catherine Billot**, daughter of Pierre Billot and Anne Rose, married **Urbain Jagot**, son of Urbain Jagot and Catherine Lelièvre, 1 September 1670 in Québec. Gagné believes that the couple returned to France [Gagné, p. 88; Jetté, p. 589].
- Geneviève Billot**, daughter of Ignace Billot and Madeleine Blangi, married **Jean Denis**, son of Jean Denis and Jeanne Payen, *circa* 24 August 1670 (date of contract). The couple and their children moved to Acadie shortly after 7 August 1698 [Gagné, p. 88; Jetté, p. 334].
- Lucrèce Billot**, daughter of Marin Billot and Marie Laquerse, had a daughter Louise by **Nicolas Grandin**; Louise was baptized 11 September 1668 and buried 26 December 1668 in Québec. Lucrèce married **Jean Sigouin**, son of Jacques Sigouin and Jeanne LeBer, 26 August 1669 in Québec [Gagné, p. 89; Jetté, p. 1048].
- Jeanne Bilodeau**, widow of Jacques Baubiche, married **Pierre Couillard**, son of Pierre Couillard and Marguerite Durandel, 8 February 1666 in Trois-Rivières [Gagné, p. 89; Jetté, p. 279].
- Marguerite Binaudière**, daughter of Robert Binaudière and Renée Godessant, married **Symphorien Rousseau**, son of Mathurin Rousseau and Françoise Cormeron or Coranvon, and widower of Jeanne Sinalon, 30 August 1670 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans. After Symphorien's death, Marguerite married **Claude Guyon**, son of Jean Guyon and Mathurine Robin, and widower of Catherine Colin, 1 December 1688 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans [Gagné, p. 90; Jetté, pp. 548, 1012].
- ***Marie Birard** married **Pierre Pivin or Pivain dit La Récompense**, widower of Marie or Marguerite Jobin *circa* 1670 in Charlesbourg. The names of their parents are not known [Gagné, pp. 89-90; Jetté, p. 925].
- Renée Biret**, daughter of Jean Biret and Simonne Périnne, married **Pierre Balan dit Lacombe**, son of Pierre Balan and Perrine Courier, 9 June 1672 in Québec. After Pierre Balan's death, Renée Biret married **Jean Brias dit Latreille** *circa* 1688 in La Durantaye. His parents and origins are not known. After Jean Brias' death, Renée Biret married **François Lavergne**, son of François Lavergne and Guillemette Péronne, and widower of Françoise Lefrançois and Jeanne Chartier, 15 April 1709 in La Durantaye [Gagné, pp. 91-92; Jetté, pp. 42, 169, 666].
- Marie Anne Blain**, daughter of Étienne Blain and Catherine Labbé, married **Pierre Gervais**, son of Jean Gervais and Marie Grape, 19 October 1665 in Québec [Gagné, p. 92; Jetté, p. 491].
- Anne Blainvillain**, daughter of Guillaume Blainvillain and Jeanne Légeraut or Cogevaut, married **Louis Charbonnier dit Saint-Laurent**, son of Claude Charbonnier and Catherine Dauras, *circa* 1 January 1672 (date of contract). Louis was a soldier in the Sr. Ours Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment [Gagné, pp. 92-93; Jetté, p. 227].
- Élisabeth Blais**, daughter of Claude Blais and Marguerite Verrier, married **Pierre Roche**, son of Léonard Roche and Guillemette de Catcal, and widower of Marie Lanfille, 7 October 1669 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans. After Pierre's death, Élisabeth married **Vincent Guillot**, son of Nicolas Guillot and Marie Joslain, and widower of Jeanne Sicard, 28 April 1677 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans [Gagné, p. 93; Jetté, pp. 545, 1000].
- ***Marguerite Blaise**, daughter of Jean Blaise and Mathurine Malescot, married **Jean Paquet or Pasquier**, son of Jean Paquet and Suzanne Biraudeau, *circa* 23 October 1669 (date of contract). After Jean's death, Marguerite married **Isaac Harnois**, son of Abraham Harnois and Marie Adrien, *circa* 18 January 1670 (date of contract) [Gagné, pp. 93-94; Jetté, p. 558].
- Marie Blanchard**, daughter of Jean Blanchard and Martine Lebas, married **Mathieu Brunet dit Létang**, son of Jacques Brunet and Jacqueline Recheine or Prohuie, 10 November 1667 in Québec. Mathieu Brunet made at least two voyages to the Great Lakes during the 17th century. On 10 August 1683, Jacques Baston, Laurent Benoît dit Livernois, **Mathieu Brunet dit Létang**, Antoine Desrosiers dit Lafresnière, Jean Desrosiers dit Dutremble, Martin Foisy, Jean Haudecoeur, Jean Lahaie, René Legardeur *sieur* de Beauvais, François Lucas dit Dontigny, Jacques Mongeau, Joseph Montonen *sieur* LaRue, Jean Pilote and Eustache Prévost, partners in a trading voyage to the Illinois, departed from Michilimackinac. They were attacked by the Iroquois the following spring, pillaged and eventually set free. In 1685, Nicolas Perrot hired **Mathieu Brunet** for a voyage to *Baie des Puants* (present-day Green Bay, Wisconsin). Two of their sons were *engagés*. On 19 and 20 May 1692 Joseph

- Loisel, Antoine Bazinet *dit* Tourblanche & Pierre Janot Lachapelle hired François Morel, Louis Tessier, Dominique Étienne, Joseph Desautels, and **Michel Brunet** for a voyage to the 8ta8ois (Ottawa Indians). On 7 June 1694, Charles Legardeur *sieur* L'Isle, hired Pierre Mallet, Pierre Tessier, **Jean Brunet dit Létang**, and Pierre Perras *dit* Lafontaine for a voyage to Michilimackinac. **Jean Brunet dit Létang** was part of the 10 July 1703 convoy to Détroit. After Mathieu Brunet died, Marie married **Yves Lucas dit Saint-Venant**, son of François Lucas and Marguerite Selève, and widower, of Perrine Lapierre, *circa* 1713 [Gagné, pp. 94-96; Jetté, pp. 180, 746; Library and Archives Canada (www.collectionscanada.gc.ca), Mikan # 2318653 – 1683; *RAPQ*, pp. 202 – 1692 and 1694, 208 – 1703]
- Jeanne Blondeau**, daughter of Jean Blondeau and Jacqueline Morin, married **René Abraham dit Desmarais**, son of Jean Abraham and Jeanne Brassart, 16 November 1671 in Trois-Rivières. On 24 July 1688, Jean Péré formed a society for a voyage to the Ottawa with the following *voyageurs*: Joseph Delestre, *sieur* Lemoine, René Abraham, Ignace Durand, Pierre Fafard, and René Fort/Lefort [Gagné, p. 96; Jetté, p. 2; *MNR*, Vol. 1, p. 231 – 1688].
- Antoinette Bluteau**, daughter of Louis Bluteau and Antoinette Legrand, married **David or Joseph Lacroix**, son of Jacques Lacroix and Antoinette Chambon, 19 October 1671 in Québec. After Antoinette's death, David Lacroix married Barthélemie Maillou [Gagné, pp. 96-97; Jetté, pp. 625-626].
- Marie Boileau** married **Pierre Chauvin** *circa* 1668 on Île d'Orléans. The names of their parents and origins in France are unknown. After Pierre Chauvin's death Marie married **Simon Chamberland**, son of René Chamberland and Catherine David, 28 November 1669 at Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans. After Simon's death, Marie married **Jean Jolin**, widower of Suzanne Moreau, 4 April 1690 in St-François, Île d'Orléans. The names of his parents and origins in France are not known [Gagné, pp. 97-98; Jetté, pp. 219, 242, 602].
- Catherine (de) Boisandré**, daughter of Jacques (de) Boisandré, *sieur* de l'Ormelée, and Marie de Vieuville, married **Marc Antoine Gobelin dit Cinq-Mars or Saint-Mars**, son of Pierre Gobelin and Madeleine Lebel, 20 October 1663 in Québec. After Catherine's death, Marc Antoine married Françoise Chapelain [Gagné, p. 178; Jetté, p. 507].
- Jeanne Claude (de) Boisandré**, daughter of Jacques (de) Boisandré, *sieur* de l'Ormelée, and Marie de Vieuville, and widower of Pierre Rancourt married **Louis Lachaise dit Georges d'Amboise**, son of Louis Lachaise and Marie Georgette, 31 October 1667 in Québec. Louis was a soldier in the Contrecoeur Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. After Louis' death, Jeanne Claude married **Jean Létourneau**, son of David Létourneau and Sébastienne Guéry, *circa* 15 January 1668 (date of contract). After Jeanne Claude's death, he married Anne Dufresne. [Gagné, pp. 178-179; Jetté, pp. 623, 728].
- Françoise Boivin** married **Louis Lamoureux** *circa* 1668 in Longueuil. The names of their parents and their origins in France are not known. Their son **Jean Baptiste Lamoureux** was an *engagé*. On 4 August 1688, Jean Boucher and **Jean Baptiste Lamoureux** recorded an agreement for a voyage to the 8ta8as (Ottawa Indians); Lamoureux agreed that he would replace Boucher on the voyage. On 14 September 1694 François Daupin, *sieur* de LaForest, and Henri Tonty hired **Jean Baptiste Lamoureux** and Charles Patenaude for a voyage des Illinois [Gagné, p. 98; Jetté, p. 640; *RAPQ*, p. 203 - 1694; Claude Mauge and Antoine Roy (editor), *Inventaire des Greffes des Notaires du Régime Français* (Québec: 1947), Volume 9 (IX), p. 148 – 1688].
- Marie Louise Bolper**, daughter of Gilles Bolper and Nicole Lechef, married **François Marceau**, son of André Marceau and Marie Grand or Guignard, 12 October 1671 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans. After François' death, Marie Louise married **Gabriel Roger**, son of René Roger and Jeanne Augéard, and widower of Marie (de) Lacour, 17 November 1687 in St-François, Île d'Orléans. After Gabriel's death, Marie Louise married **Antoine Olivier Quiniart dit Duplessis**, son of Antoine Quiniart and Jeanne Branquais, 3 February 1701 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans [Gagné, p. 98; Jetté, pp. 762, 956, 1003].
- ***Marie Bonheur on Bonville**, daughter of Toussaint Bonheur and Louise Belheur, married **Paul Inard**, son of Barthélemi Inard and Françoise Rineau, 27 October 1669 in Ste-Famille, Île d'Orléans. Paul Inard was a soldier in the Maximy Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment [Gagné, p. 99; Jetté, p. 586].
- Nicole (de) Bonin**, daughter of Émery (de) Bonin, *sieur* de Navigny or Marigny and Catherine de Carmiquiel, married **Damien Quatresous**, son of Mathieu Quatresous and Jeanne Lessouchon, 19 October 1671 in Québec. Their son **François Xavier Quatresous** was part of the 16 July 1702 convoy to Détroit [Gagné, p. 179; Jetté, p. 953; *RAPQ*, p. 207].
- Hélène Bonneau**, daughter of Pierre Bonneau and Marie Regnaud married **Jacques Desmoulins**, son of Hugues Desmoulins and Philippote Hache, 18 July 1667 in Québec. After Hélène's death, Jacques married Marie Jeanne Achin, widower of Pierre Fourier [Gagné, pp. 100-101; Jetté, p. 344].
