

**Filles du Roi – Part 4 – Marie Charlotte (de) Coppequesne to Marie Deschamps (3)**

If Peter Gagné<sup>1</sup> includes additional biographical information in addition to occupations or genealogical facts, the name of the *Fille du Roi* or her spouse, their names are marked with an \*.

**Marie Charlotte (de) Coppequesne**, daughter of Adolph Coppequesne, *sieur* de Bezonville, and Honorée de Nointel, married **Jean Gateau**, son of Mathurin Gateau and Renée Lefebvre, 10 January 1667 in Montréal. After his death, she married **Jacques Brault**, son of Pierre Brault and Marie Chauvin, 1 March 1688 in Montréal [Gagné, pp. 184-185; Jetté, pp. 165, 469].

**Marie Catherine Cotin dit d'Arras**, daughter of François Cotin and Jeanne LeCain, married **Pierre Brunet**, son of Vincent Brunet and Cécile Guédor or Guédot, 1 February 1666 in Québec. Prior to their marriage, Marie Catherine had a daughter; Jetté and Gagné believed that Pierre Brunet was the father. After Pierre Brunet's death, Marie Catherine Cotin married **Pierre Mandin**, son of Mathurin Mandin and Renée Chaynet, 20 August 1685 in Charlesbourg. Their son **Mathurin Mandin** was hired to go to Detroit in 1703 and 1706: On 10 July 1703, the *Compagnie de la Colonie* hired **Mathurin Mandin**, of Charlesbourg, to make a voyage to Détroit [Adhémar; *RAPQ1930*,<sup>2</sup> p. 208]. On 13 May 1706, Cadillac hired him for a voyage to Détroit [Notary Florent de La Cetièrre, LAC – Mikan – 3081026] [Gagné, pp. 159-160; Jetté, p. 760].

**Marie Couet**, daughter of Michel Couet and Marie Mauger, married **Jean Leclerc**, son of Antoine Leclerc and Michelle Rubel, 11 November 1669 in Ste-Famille, Île Orléans [Gagné, p. 160; Jetté, p. 675].

**Françoise Cousin**, daughter of Martin Cousin and Marie Hubert, married **François Gaudreau**, son of François Gaudreau and Marie Unknown, 13 October 1665 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 160-161; Jetté, p. 471].

**Anne Couture**, daughter of Jacques Couture and Marie Chevalier, married **Jean Moreau dit LaGrange**, son of Jean Moreau and Jeanne Doucet, 12 November 1665 in Château-Richer [Gagné, p. 161; Jetté, p. 829].

**Isabelle Couturier**, daughter of Jean Couturier and Christine Daingle, married **François Chantelou**, son of Isaac Chantelou and Marie Girard, 15 September 1670 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 161-162; Jetté, p. 222].

**Charlotte Coy**, daughter of François Coy and Michelle Ouyer, married **Jean Brard dit LaReverdra**, son of André Brard and Andrée Perier, *circa* 12 November 1669 (contract – Ameau – Trois-Rivières). He was a soldier in the LaFouille Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. After Jean Brard's death, Charlotte married **Pierre Brunion or Brignon dit Lapierre**, 24 April 1678 in Sorel. The names of his parents are not known. Pierre Brunion was also a member of the LaFouille Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. Their son **Jean Brunion** came to Detroit in 1706: On 15 June 1706, Antoine de Lamothe Cadillac, *commandant of Fort Pontchartrain du Détroit*, hired Jacques Morisseau, **Jean Brunion dit Lapierre**, and Pierre Collet, of Batiscan, to make a voyage to Détroit. [Antoine Adhémar, *MNR*,<sup>3</sup> Vol. 2, 391-392; *RAPQ1930*, p. 210]. On 28 September 1706, **Jean Brunion dit Lapierre** reported to Antoine Adhémar's office where Cadillac's agent, François Ardouin, paid him the remainder of the 100 *livres* owed to him for his 1706 voyage to Détroit [Boivin Sommerville, 1706, *MHH*, July 2006, pp. 138-141; Antoine Adhémar, *MNR*, Vol. 2, p. 401]. [Gagné, pp. 162-163; Jetté, pp. 164, 183].

**Marie Crépin** married **Jean Fournier** before 1667. Jetté notes that they could have married in France. The names of their parents are not known [Gagné, p. 163; Jetté, p. 438].

**Élisabeth Cretel**, daughter of Guillaume Cretel and Jeanne Godfroy, married **Nicolas Langlois**, son of Charles Langlois and Marie Cordier, 26 October 1671 in Quebec [Gagné, p. 163; Jetté, p. 646].

**Marie Croiset**, daughter of Pierre Croiset and Marie Brouarde, married **Jean Laquerre dit Rencontre**, son of Joseph Laquerre and Marguerite Dubois, *circa* 29 August 1671 (contract LaRue – La Pérade). Jean was a soldier in the LaNoraye Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. Their son **Pierre Laquerre** was an *engagé*. On 21 August 1696 Edmond Chorel hired Pierre Masson, **Pierre Laquerre**, and Jean Pepin for a voyage to the *8ta8ois* (Ottawa) [Maugue and Roy, Volume 9, p. 255]. After Jean Laquerre's death, Marie married **Pierre Lévesque**, son of Gilles Lévesque and Mathurine Tibault, *circa* 10 August 1677 (contract Roy

- dit* Châtellerault – La Pérade). Their son **Edmond Lévesque** was hired to go to Detroit in 1705. On 30 April 1705, the Directors of the *Compagnie de la Colonie de Canada* hired François Morneau and **Edmond Lévesque**, of Ste-Anne de Batiscan, Jacques Forcier, of St-François, Jacques Réaume, of the coast of Beaupré, to make a voyage to Détroit [Chamballon and Roy,<sup>4</sup> Vol. 19, p. 138]. [Gagné, p. 164; Jetté, p. 652].
- Jeanne Crosnier**, daughter of Guillaume Crosnier and Jeanne Cholen or Cante, married **François Magnan**, son of Pierre Magnan and Jeanne Reneau, 30 September 1669 in Québec. According to Gagné, they returned to France [Gagné, p. 164; Jetté, p. 750].
- Martine Crosnier**, daughter of Pierre Crosnier and Jeanne Rotreau, married **Philippe Destroismaisons dit Picard**, son of Adrien Destroismaisons and Antoinette Leroux, 18 November 1669 in Château-Richer [Gagné, p. 165; Jetté, p. 350].
- Françoise Curé**, daughter of Pierre Curé and Barbe Charles, married **Lucas Loiseau or Loyseau**, son of Jacques Loiseau and Marie Rouette, *circa* 19 December 1669 (contract Frérot – Boucherville). Their son **Joachim Loiseau** was an *engageur* in 1715. On 7 April 1715, he hired Baptiste Denoyon to make a voyage to the Ottawa [RAPQ1930, p. 216]. [Gagné, pp. 165-166; Jetté, p. 739].
- Anne Dailly**, daughter of Pascal or Pasquet Dailly, *sieur* de Duplessis, and Étienne Dupré, married **Jacques Lesot**, son of Laurent Lesot and Françoise Guiche, and widower of Marthe Gagnon, 28 October 1671 in Château-Richer [Gagné, p. 167; Jetté, p. 723].
- Marie Dain** married **François Marquet** *circa* 1669 in Île d'Orléans; the names of their parents are not known. After Marie's death, he married Anne Philippe, widow of François Bacquet [Gagné, p. 167; Jetté, pp. 773-774].
- Marie Dallon**, daughter of Michel Dallon and Marguerite Veronne, married **\*Pierre Bissonnet**, son of Jacques Bissonnet and Guillemette Debien, and widower of Marie Allaire, 9 October 1668 in Québec. He was previously married to Mathurine Desbordes but their marriage was annulled because it was discovered that his first wife was still alive. Pierre's son by his second marriage **Jacques Bissonnet dit Lafavry or Lafaverie** was identified as a *voyageur*, but no details are provided in Jetté. After Pierre Bissonnet's death, Marie married **Jacques Anet**, son of Robert Anet and Élisabeth Lerat, and widower of Marie Bourgois, between 1687 and 1692 in La Durantaye. After Jacques Anet's death, Marie married **Pierre Guillaume Hublé**, son of Pierre Hublé and Olive Layne, 19 April 1694 in La Durantaye [Gagné, pp. 168-169; Jetté, pp. 16; 107-108; 577].
- Denise Damané**, daughter of Michel Damané and Catherine Toureau, married **René Houray dit Grandmont**, son of Jacques Houray and Marguerite Castillon, *circa* 26 October 1665 (contract – LaTouche – Champlain). Their son **Jean Houray** was hired to go to Detroit; his name is spelled Houvé in the contracts. On 16 July 1702, the *Compagnie de la Colonie* hired **Jean Houvé**, of Champlain, to make a voyage to Détroit [Adhémar; RAPQ1930, p. 207]. On 28 July 1704, the *Compagnie de la Colonie* hired **Jean Houvé**, of Champlain, to make a voyage to Détroit [Adhémar; RAPQ1930, p. 209-210]. [Gagné, pp. 169-170; Jetté, p. 573].
- \*Claude Damisé**, daughter of Étienne Damisé and Geneviève Pioche, married **Pierre Perthuis dit Lalime**, son of Sylvain Perthuis and Mathurine Rassicot, 10 December 1668 in Montréal. Pierre Perthuis dit Lalime was a soldier in the Salières Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. In 1676, Claude had a son by Jean Paradis. After Claude's death in 1705, Pierre married Françoise Moisan, widow of Antoine Brunet 13 February 1707 in Montréal. **Pierre Perthuis, père**, was a merchant and *engageur*. On 13 May 1695, **Pierre Perthuis** hired Pierre and Toussaint Hunault to travel to Michilimackinac [Antoine Adhémar; RAPQ1930, p. 203]. Pierre Perthuis,  *fils*, followed in his father's footsteps, He was a fur merchant and an *engageur*, hiring men to travel to Detroit between 1718 and 1726. **Pierre Perthuis, fils**, and his wife Marie Catherine Mallet moved to Detroit in about 1718 [Gagné, pp. 170-171; Jetté, pp. 902-903].
- Marie Damois**, daughter of Pierre Damois and Marie Lefebvre, married **Léonard Faucher dit Saint Maurice**, son of Barthélemi Faucher and Sibille Brians, 15 October 1669 in Québec [Gagné, p. 171; Jetté, p. 412].
- Hélène Damours**, daughter of Nicolas Damours and Madeleine Saison, married **Louis Foucher dit Laforest**, son of Jean Foucher and Renée Hymbert, 6 August 1668 in Québec. After Louis Foucher's death, Hélène married Isaac **Lemire**, son of Nicolas Lemire and Jeanne Lecomte 5 June 1686 in Batiscan [Gagné, pp. 171-172; Jetté, pp. 434-435, 710].
- Esther or Marie Anne Dannessé de Longchamps**, daughter of Charles Dannessé, *sieur* de Longchamps, and Agnès Vivien, married **François Couillard dit Lafontaine**, son of Michel Couillard and Catherine Fleury, 17 October 1668 in Québec. François Couillard *dit* Lafontaine was a soldier in the Berthier Company (detached from the l'Allier Regiment) of the Carignan Salières Regiment. After François Couillard's death, Esther married **Pierre Janson dit Lapalme**, son of Barthélemi Janson and Jeanne Duvoisin, 29 September 1688 in Québec.

After Esther's death, Pierre Janson married Ursule Rancin, widow of Pierre Hédouin. Following Ursule's death, Pierre married Geneviève Pelletier [Gagné, pp. 172-173; Jetté, pp. 279, 592].

**Gabrielle d'Anneville** was the daughter of Brice d'Anneville and Marguerite Roy. Gabrielle's mother was also a *Fille du Roi*. Gabrielle's sister Anne came to New France in 1664 with her husband Antoine Filion and son Pierre Filion. Gabrielle d'Anneville married **Louis Blanchard**, son of Pierre Blanchard and Marie Bugeaude, 27 July 1665 in Québec. After Louis Blanchard's death, Gabrielle married **Mathieu de Lagrange**, son of Jean Lagrange and Catherine Jouenceau, 12 June 1684 in Québec. After Mathieu de Lagrange's death, she married **\*Hilaire Bernard, sieur de La Rivière**, widower of Marguerite Gillet and Marie Madeleine Voyer, 22 September 1712 in Beauport. **Hilaire Alexandre Bernard**, the son of Marie Madeleine Voyer and Hilaire Bernard was an *engagé*. On 9 August 1719, François Beaune hired **Bernard Desrivière** to make a voyage to the *pays d'en haut* [RAPQ1930, p. 228] [Gagné, pp. 173-174; Jetté, pp. 89 – Hilaire Bernard's parents are not known, 113, 630].

**Marie Debure**, daughter of Vincent Debure and Suzanne Golin, married **Gilles Énard or Esnard**, son of Pierre Énard and Hilaire Guirout, 6 October 1665 in Québec. After Gilles' death, Marie married **Jean Bernard dit Anse or Hanse**, son of Jean Bernard and Catherine Fauden, 27 December 1666 in Québec [Gagné, pp. 180-181; Jetté, pp. 89, 405].

**Jeanne Déchard**, daughter of Claude Déchard and Jeanne Billard, married **Jean Collet dit LePicard**, son of Nicolas Collet and Marguerite Jullien, 16 February 1668 in Montréal. Jean Collet was a soldier in the Petit Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. Their son **Pierre Collet** came to Détroit five times during its first ten years. On 27 May 1701, Jean Bochart de Champigny hired **Pierre Collet**, of Québec, as part of the original convoy to Détroit [Adhémar; RAPQ1930, pp. 205-206]. He wintered over at Détroit and was paid 300 *livres* as an annual wage [Kent, *Detroit*,<sup>5</sup> Vol. 2, 1021]. On 14 June 1702, the General Directors of the *Compagnie de la Colonie de Canada* hired **Pierre Collet**, of Ste-Anne de Batiscan, to make a voyage to Détroit and to return during the fall of 1702 [Chamballon and Roy, Vol. 18, pp. 337-338]. On 15 June 1706, Antoine de Lamothe Cadillac, *commandant of Fort Pontchartrain du Détroit*, hired Jacques Morisseau, Jean Brunion dit Lapierre, and **Pierre Collet**, of Batiscan, to make a voyage to Détroit [Antoine Adhémar, *MNR*, Vol. 2, pp. 391-392; RAPQ1930, p. 210]. On 20 May 1708, Paul Dumouchel, acting for himself and for Jean Tabault, hired **Pierre Collet** to help transport merchandise and other goods to Détroit [Antoine Adhémar, *MNR*, Vol. 2, pp. 478-480; RAPQ1930, p. 212]. On 6 June 1710, Robert Janot, Joseph Bazinet dit Tourblanche, Nicolas Gros, of Montréal, and **Pierre Collet**, of Batiscan, *voyageurs*, declared to Étienne Veron de Grandmesnil, acting for Antoine de Lamothe Cadillac, that they would transport merchandise to Détroit for Cadillac and would return to Montréal with furs. [Antoine Adhémar, *MNR*, Vol. 2, pp. 565-566]. After Jeanne Déchard's death, Jean Collet married Élisabeth Lefebvre, widow of Félix Thunay, and Marguerite Éloy, widow of Jean Cosset [Gagné, pp. 181-182; Jetté, p. 265].

**Adrienne Delastre**, daughter of Nicolas Delastre and Anne Garry, married **Pierre Mortrel**, son of Guillaume Mortrel and Marie Heresson, 16 November 1665 in Château-Richer [Gagné, p. 195; Jetté, p. 840].

**Madeleine Delaunay**, daughter of Claude Delaunay and Marguerite Plau or Plan, married **Pierre Guillet dit Lajeunesse**, son of François Guillet and Perrine Ménard, and widower of Jeanne Saint-Père, *circa* 11 October 1670 (contract – Becquet). Three of Pierre Guillet's sons by his first wife were *engageurs* or *voyageurs*. **Joseph Guillet**: On 4 September 1691 Louis Durand was hired by a society represented by Charles Dizy and Claude Renaud in favor of **Joseph Guillet, sieur de Bellefeuille**, for a voyage to the *8ta8ois* (Ottawa Indians) [Antoine Adhémar; RAPQ1930, p. 200]. On 29 April 1692, **Joseph Guillet** hired Gilles Chauvin for a voyage *des 8ta8ois* (Ottawa Indians) [Antoine Adhémar *MNR*, Vol. 1, p. 266]. On 19 August 1692, **Joseph Guillet** hired Gilles Chauvin and Louis Durand for a voyage to the *8ta8ois* (Ottawa Indians) [Antoine Adhémar *MNR*, Vol. 1, p. 271]. On 26 September 1697, Jean Soumande, merchant, recorded a debt from Jean Baptiste Rolland, **Joseph Guillet**, Robert Giguère, Michel Étienne dit Philippe, all of whom are described as *voyageurs*, for merchandise; the description of the men as *voyageurs* implies that they had purchased the merchandise for a voyage to the Great Lakes [Pottier and Roy,<sup>6</sup> Vol. 11, p. 194]. **Louis Guillet and Mathurin Guillet**: On 30 May 1682 Jean Baptiste de Peiras/de Peyras, Jacques Gourday, resident of Québec [possibly Jacques Gourdeau, *sieur de LaGrossardière*, **Mathurin Guillet**, **Louis Guillet**, and Jean Rougeau/Rougeot dit Berger/Bergé reached an

- agreement regarding a *congé* granted by Frontenac for trading with the *Sta8as* (Ottawa) [Maugue and Roy,<sup>7</sup> Vol. 9, p. 82]. Pierre Guillet's grandson, **Paul Alexandre Guillet** also was an *engageur*. He spent a significant amount of time in Détroit. Due to space considerations, I have only included references to the contracts. On 19 May 1708, Jean Alexis Lemoine, François Rivard de Montendre, of Batiscan, **Paul Guillet**, of Montréal, and Alexis Germain, of Cap Santé, promised François Ardouin, acting for Antoine de Lamothe Cadillac, that they would transport merchandise to Détroit for Cadillac in one of the two canoes that Lemoine had permission to take to Détroit under the concession that Cadillac granted to Lemoine [Antoine Adhémar, *MNR*, Vol. 2, 477-478]. On 6 September 1710, **Sieur Paul Guillet** hired Michel Tousignant *dit* Lapointe, of Lotbinière, to make a voyage to Détroit [Antoine Adhémar, *MNR*, Vol. 2, 584-585]. On 6 September 1710, **Paul Guillet**, of Montréal, Michel Tousignant *dit* Lapointe, of Lotbinière and Guillet's *engagé*, and Michel Campeau, *habitant* of Détroit, declared to Étienne Veron *de* Grandmesnil, acting for Antoine de Lamothe Cadillac, that they would transport merchandise to Détroit for Cadillac [Antoine Adhémar, *MNR*, Vol. 2, 583-584]. [Gagné, p. 196; Jetté, p. 543].
- Anne Delestre** married **François César dit La Gardelette** circa 1674 in St-Ours. Their origins and parents are not known. After Anne Delestre's death, François César married Marie Hatanville, widow of Charles Martin [Gagné, p. 196; Jetté, p. 213].
- Marguerite Delorme**, daughter of Hugues Delorme and Marie Maupain, married **René Chartier**, widower of Madeleine Ranger, 1 October 1669 in Québec. René's first wife died in 1662 in Poitiers. After Marguerite Delorme's death, René Chartier married Louise Nepple, widow of Benjamin Anceau. René Chartier's sons by his first wife were fur merchants. Native Americans killed **Pierre Chartier** in April 1684 at Fort St. Louis des Illinois [Jetté, p. 235]. **Martin Chartier** was a fur merchant in the area of present-day Pittsburg, Pennsylvania [Jetté, p. 235]. [Gagné, p. 198; Jetté, p. 235].
- Jeanne Denot**, daughter of Antoine Denot and Catherine Leduc, married **André Robidou dit L'Espagnol**, son of Emmanuel Robidou and Catherine Alve, 7 June 1667 in Québec. After André Robidou's death, Jeanne married Jacques **Suprenant dit Sanssoucy**, son of Jacques Suprenant and Louise Roquet, 16 August 1678 in Laprairie. Jacques Suprenant was a soldier in the Contrecoeur Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment [Gagné, p. 202; Jetté, pp. 996, 1058].
- Marie Denoyon**, daughter of Adrien Denoyon and Catherine Chevalier, married **Charles Davenne**, son of Jean Davenne and Françoise Haran or Havan and widower of Marguerite Marot, 8 September 1670 in Château-Richer [Gagné, pp. 202-203; Jetté, pp. 311-312].
- Anne Dequain**, daughter of Florimond Dequain and Henriette Fermilis, married **François Lareau**, son of Jacques Lareau and Anne Fossé, 28 October 1669 in Québec [Gagné, p. 205; Jetté, p. 655].
- \***Claude Deschalets**, daughter of François Deschalets and Jacqueline Chevallereau, married **Siméon Roy or Leroy dit Ody or Audy**, son of Richard Roy and Gillette Jacquet, 3 September 1668 in Québec [Gagné, p. 206; Jetté, p. 1018].
- Élisabeth Deschalets**, daughter of François Deschalets and Jacqueline Chevallereau, married **François Paris**, son of Claude Paris and Élisabeth Lourdet, 26 November 1668 in Québec [Gagné, p. 207; Jetté, p. 879].
- \***Madeleine Deschalets**, daughter of François Deschalets and Jacqueline Chevallereau, married **Jean Giron**, son of Jean Giron and Anne Renaut, 3 September 1668 in Québec. After Madeleine Deschalet's death, he married Charlotte de Chavigny, widow of René Breton [Gagné, p. 208; Jetté, p. 502].
- Anne Deschamps**, daughter of Charles Deschamps and Jeanne Dacheville or d'Archeville, married **Michel Boutet dit Lépine**, son of Gilbert Boutet and Marguerite Coullau, 29 October 1669 in Québec [Gagné, p. 209; Jetté, p. 157].
- Marie Deschamps** (1), daughter of Jean Deschamps and Madeleine Toutain, married **Pierre Pouillard**, son of Michel Pouillard and Jacqueline Laurens, 12 October 1667 in Québec [Gagné, p. 209; Jetté, p. 938].
- Marie Deschamps** (2), daughter of Claude Deschamps and Jeanne Briole, married **Michel Verret dit Laverdure**, son of Jean Verret and Jeanne de la Prés, 13 October 1669 in Québec. After Marie Deschamps' death, he married Marie Galarneau [Gagné, p. 209-210; Jetté, p. 1121].
- Marie Deschamps** (3) married **Marin Marais dit Labarre** circa 1672 in Louiseville; the names of their parents are not known. Marin Marias was a soldier in the LaFouille Company of the Carignan Salières Regiment. After the death of Marie Deschamps, he married Marie Anne Guédon, widow of Gabriel Benoît [Gagné, p. 210; Jetté, p. 761].
