List of habitants who are south of the [Detroit] River from the Ottawa Village to the Huron Village

D Estre *père*,¹ age 63, born in Canada, 3 *arpents*, 5 boys, 2 girls, 0 slaves, 0 hired men, poor. Annotations: **Antoine Deshêtres** may have been from New England. At present, his origin is unknown. His marriage to **Marie Charlotte Chevalier**, daughter of Jean Baptiste Chevalier and Françoise Alavoine, was recorded as 30 October 1729 in the church register at Michilimackinac in the early section of transcribed records. She was born 3 August 1710 in Montréal. Their surviving unmarried children were Antoine, Louis de Gonzague *dit* Pigeon, Hyacinthe, Marie Josèphe, Jeanne. Two additional daughters were baptized at Fort St. Joseph: Marie Catherine [1732] and Suzanne Esther [1742], but their fate is unknown. When Hyacinthe married Marie Anne Pilet 6 February 1764 in Ste Anne du Détroit, his father was described as a master *armurier* (gunsmith) *demeurant sur sa terre en la coste des outaouais*. Because of the discrepancy in the number of children enumerated versus the known names, and errors in Denissen the following information, from the Cicotte Ledger (see source in end notes), is being added here. “**Antoine Deshêtres, père** [not in Lajeunesse], settled at *la rivière* St. Joseph, and came from there with his wife, three *grands garçons* (grown sons / big unmarried sons), and six other children to settle at Détroit on the shore of Lake Ste. Claire on the North Shore. They were given eight rations from 3 August 1751 to 3 February 1753. The names of the three grown or adult sons are not specifically given. The known children were: **Louis**, born at night and baptized 26 January 1731 at Rivière Saint Joseph (present-day Niles, Michigan); **Marie Catherine**, born the 8th of (unreadable) 1732 and baptized then by a missionary, supplied the formal rites of baptism on 19 September 1734 at St. Joseph; **Marie Anne**, born 6 October 1734 and baptized by the commandant, with the full rites of baptism supplied 25 July 1735 at St. Joseph; **Louis de Gonzague** (*dit* Pigeon), born 13 August 1736 and baptized the 15th in the absence of a missionary by the commandant, with the full rites supplied 21 June 1738 at St. Joseph; **Antoine Hyacinthe**, born 15 October 1737 and given lay baptism (*ondoyé*) the same day by the *commandant*, with the full rites supplied 21 June 1738 at St. Joseph; **Susanne Esther**, born in the month of October and baptized on 29 October 1743 at St. Joseph; **Marie Josèphe**, born 27 September 1747; and **Jeanne**, born 29 December 1749. A daughter **Thérèse** was born 10 April 1752 at Détroit and baptized there on 20 April 1752. (**Louis**) **Antoine Deshêtres, fils** came from St. Joseph with his father and was given land on the South Shore near the Ottawa Village where he was the interpreter. His ration was part of the eight rations granted to his father and his family.” In the Cicotte Ledger (1749-1752), he is referred to as *Antoine* on one page and *Louis Antoine* on the next page. It is assumed that there is only one person being referred to, but this is open to question. It is also possible that he or they could be either one or two of the *grands garçons* who came with the family. Loraine DiCerbo’s article, “An Additional Child of Antoine Deshêtres and Marie Charlotte Chevalier,” *Michigan’s Habitant Heritage* (hereafter *MHH*), Vol. 29, #3, July 2008, 128-134, establishes that Louis, the son of Antoine who moved to the St. Louis area, had a brother who was named Antoine: “In the series of estate inventory documents surrounding Louis’ death, dating from mid-1769 to August of 1770, it became evident that Louis had a brother living in the St. Louis area.” No baptismal record survives for this Antoine, son of Antoine Deshêtres, but the records are incomplete for Fort St. Joseph [*Ste Anne Register Part 2*, image 118 – Hyacinthe’s marriage; Jetté, 247, 248; *PRDH*, #36249 – Deshêtres – Chevalier couple view; Kelley, ed., 17 – Hyacinthe’s marriage; Faribault-Beauregard, Vol. I, 181; www.ancestry.ca Drouin Collection, St-Joseph (Niles), Michigan, images 7, 8, 11, 14 of 32; Gail Moreau-DesHarnais, “Edward Cicotte Ledger 1749-1752 Containing Accounts of French Settlers at Detroit,” *MHH*, Vol. 29, #3, July 2008, 153-154; Denissen, I, 351 – misstates Marie Charlotte Chevalier’s birth date and does not give birth, baptismal dates, or locations for those children born outside the Détroit area]. 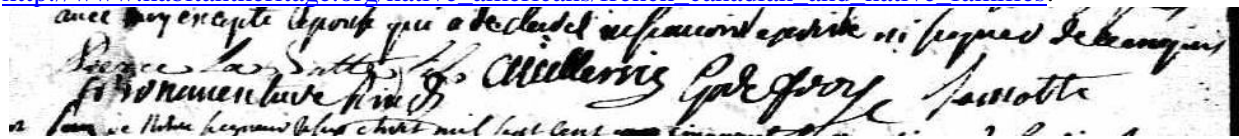

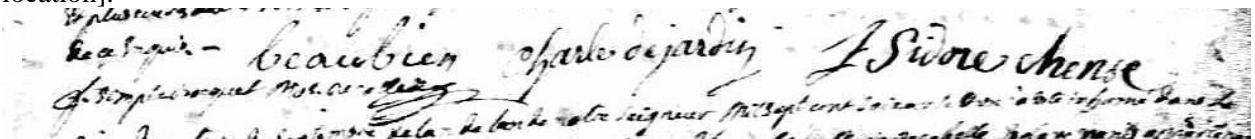
LaBute *file [sic]*, age 32, born in Canada, 4 *arpents*, 4 boys, 3 girls, 3 slaves, 2 hired men, comfortable. Annotations: **Pierre Chesne dit Labutte**, son of Pierre Chesne *dit* Labutte and Marie Madeleine Roy, was born 23 May 1729 in Détroit. Marie Madeleine Roy was the daughter of Pierre Roy and Marguerite Ouabankekoué, a Miami. He married **Marie Anne Cuillerier**, daughter of Antoine Cuillerier and Angélique Girard, 10 February 1750 in Ste Anne du Détroit. She was born 19 April 1730 in Détroit. Their children were Pierre, Claude Thomas, Alexis Louis, Julien, Marie Anne, Agathe Françoise, and Marie Catherine. When Marie Catherine was baptized at Ste Anne du Détroit on 24 February 1764, her father was described as *Sieur Pierre Labutte, Bourgeois commercant (merchant) de cette ville, demeurant a la coste des hurons*. Lisette may have been one of the slaves listed in the census. She was buried in 1764 at the age of 15. One of the other slaves was Jacquot, a *nègre* slave [*Ste Anne Register*, image 113; *Ste Anne Register Part 2*, image 100 – Marie Catherine’s baptism; Jetté, 245, 295; Kelley, ed., 7; Trudel, 303 – confuses Pierre Chesne *dit* Labute, *père*, with his son; Denissen, I, 276]. 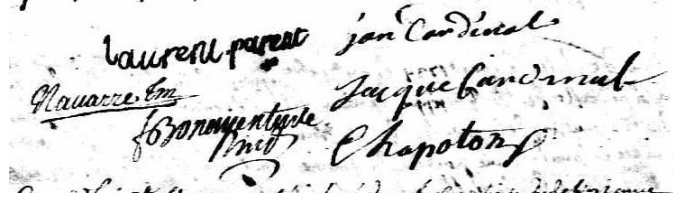
Lengloie, age 33, born in Canada, 2 *arpents*, 1 boy, 0 girls, 0 slaves, 0 hired men, poor. Annotations: **Nicolas Langlois**, son of Nicolas Langlois and Angélique Cuillerier, was born 5 January 1729 in Cap-Santé. He married **Madeleine Pilet**, daughter of Jacques Pilet and Marguerite Viau, 7 September 1761 in Ste Anne du Détroit. She was born 12 February 1740 in Boucherville. Their only child at the time of the census was a son, Jean Baptiste. When Jean Baptiste was baptized 14 March 1762 in Ste Anne du Détroit, his father was described as a *habitant* [*Ste Anne Register Part 2*, image 107 – Jean Baptiste’s baptism; Jetté, 648; *PRDH*, #14655 – Madeleine’s birth from her parents’ (Jacques Pilet and Marguerite Viau) family view; Kelley, ed., 15; Denissen, I, 675 – does not give Madeleine Pilet’s birth date or location].

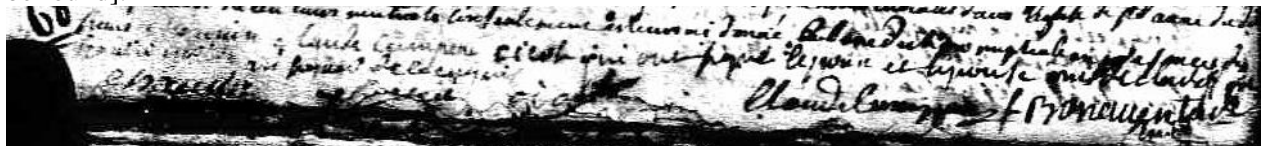
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paren,² age 59, born in Canada, 2 arpents, 3 boys, 5 girls, 0 slaves, 0 hired men, comfortable. Annotations: **Laurent Parent**, son of Michael Parent and Marie Anne Benoît, was born 28 February 1703 in Montréal. He was the widower of **Marie Josèphe Ozanne or Dauzat**, daughter of Pierre Ozanne and Marguerite Gignard; he married Marie Josèphe Ozanne, 24 May 1731 in Ste Anne du Détroit. He married **Jeanne Cardinal**, daughter of Jacques Cardinal and Jeanne Duguay, 27 July 1734 in Ste Anne du Détroit. Jeanne Cardinal was born 12 August 1717 in Montréal. Their surviving unmarried children were Laurent, Jacques, Julien, Félicité, Élisabeth, Geneviève, Marie Louise, and Agathe. On 8 September 1759, when Agathe was baptized, her father was described as a master *menuisier* (cabinet maker) *et Bourgeois de cette ville* [Ste Anne Register Part 2, image 89 – Agathe’s baptism; Jetté, 198, 861, 876; Kelley, ed., 3, 4; Denissen, II, 926-927].

J. Lesperance,³ age 34, born in Canada, 2 arpents, 0 boys, 2 girls, 0 slaves, 0 hired men, comfortable. Annotations: **Joseph Rochereau dit Lespérance**, son of Jean Rochereau and Élisabeth Déry, was baptized 11 May 1725 in Beauport. He married **Catherine Pilet**, daughter of Jacques Pilet and Marguerite Viau, 7 January 1754 in Ste Anne du Détroit. She was baptized 18 July 1737 in Boucherville. The couple had two surviving daughters, Marie Desanges and Marie Catherine. On 16 March 1762 when Marie Catherine was baptized, her father was described as a *habitant demeurant a coste des hurons* [Ste Anne Register Part 2, image 107 – Marie Catherine’s baptism; Jetté, 1001; PRDH, #14655 – Catherine’s birth from her parents’ (Jacques Pilet and Marguerite Viau) family view; Kelley, ed., 9; Denissen, II, 1094 – gives an incorrect marriage date and states that Catherine Pilet was born in 1736 but does not give a location. Denissen also states that there was a daughter Marie Catherine born 24 May 1769 [sic] Coast of the Ottawas (Sandwich) and buried 30 October 1764 Détroit. Neither her birth/baptism nor burial can be found].





Vital Gauyeau, age 24, born in Canada, 2 arpents, 0 boys, 0 girls, 0 slaves, 1 hired man, comfortable. Annotations: **Vital Goyau**, son of Jean Baptiste Goyau and Marie Anne Daragon, was born 11 May 1743 in Détroit. He never married. His parents, **Jean Baptiste Goyau dit Lagarde** and **Marie Anne Daragon**, probably lived with one of their sons listed in this section: Jean Baptiste Goyau, Vital Goyau, or Guillaume Goyau. [Ste Anne Register, image 179; Denissen, I, 546].

B. Gauyeau, age 41, born in Canada, 3 *arpents*, 4 boys, 2 girls, 0 slaves, 0 hired men, comfortable. Annotations: **Jean Baptiste Goyau**, son of Jean Baptiste Goyau and Marie Anne Deguire *dite* Larose, was born 3 November 1722 in Détroit. He married **Marie Louise Angélique Delière/Deslières dite Bonvouloir**, daughter of Julian Delière and Marthe Daragon, 10 January 1747 at the Huron Mission on Bois Blanc Island. She was born 6 February 1724 in Montréal. Their surviving children were Jean Baptiste, Antoine, Louis, Nicolas, Madeleine, Marie Catherine, and Marie Louise. On 10 June 1761 when Nicolas was baptized, his father was described as a *habitant de la coste des hurons* [*Ste Anne Register*, image 90; *Ste Anne Register Part 2*, image 102 – Nicolas’ baptism; Jetté, 322, 522; Denissen, I, 546-547 – gives Marie Louise Angélique Deslière’s baptismal date as her birth date. Transcribers’ note: There were three girls, not two as enumerated in the census].

G. Gauyeau, age 30, born in Canada, 3 *arpents*, 0 boys, 0 girls, 0 slaves, 0 hired men, comfortable. Annotations: **Guillaume Goyau**, son of Jean Baptiste Goyau and Marie Deguire *dite* Larose, was born 24 September 1728 in Détroit. He never married [*Ste Anne Register*, image 108; Jetté, 522; Denissen, I, 546].

L. Reaume,⁴ age 55, born in Canada, 3 *arpents*, 2 boys, 2 girls, 1 slave, 1 hired man, comfortable. Annotations: It’s possible that the first initial was recorded in error. Most likely, this is a reference to **Pierre Réaume**, son of Robert Réaume and Catherine Belhumeur, who was born 3 October 1709 in Lachine. He married **Suzanne Hubert dite Lacroix**, daughter of Louis Hubert *dit* Lacroix and Madeleine Trottier, 20 January 1738 in Ste Anne du Détroit. She was born 8 August 1709 in Montréal. Their surviving unmarried children were Claude Thomas, Bonaventure, Véronique, and Marie Louise. On 23 November 1760, when their daughter Suzanne married Jacques Baby, her father was described as *Sieur Pierre Reaume Bourgeois negotiant (merchant) de cette ville, et enseigne des Milices Bourgoise de cette ville* [*Ste Anne Register Part 2*, image 97 – Suzanne’s marriage; Jetté, 576, 971; Kelley, ed., 4; Trudel, 405 – based on Russell’s identification states that the slaves were owned by a Louis Réaume; Denissen, II, 1031 – gives Pierre’s baptismal date as his birth date and gives Suzanne’s baptismal date as her birth date].


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Dusault, age 40, born in Canada, 3 *arpents*, 2 boys, 4 girls, 0 slaves, 1 hired man, poor. Annotations: **Louis Joseph Toupin dit Dussault**, son of Jean François Toupin and Marie Madeleine Constantineau, was born 15 February 1735 in Neuville. He married **Louise Marie Beaudry dite Desbuttes dite St-Martin**, daughter of Jean Baptiste Beaudry and Marie Louise Doyon, and widow of **Jacques Godé/Godet dit Marentette**, 11 January 1762 in the Church of the Hurons and recorded in Ste Anne du Détroit. Louise Marie Beaudry was born 30 January 1724 in Québec and baptized the following day under the name Louise Geneviève Marguerite. They had one son, Jean François. The household as enumerated probably included Louise Marie Beaudry's surviving children by Jacques Godé/Godet: Joseph Charles, Marie Louise, Geneviève, Madeleine, and Angélique [*Ste Anne Register Part 2*, Image 106 – signatures of the witnesses so not appear in the register of Ste Anne's where the marriage was recorded; Jetté, 67; *PRDH*, #13799 – Louise Marie Beaudry's marriage to Jacques Godé/Godet from her parents' (Jean Baptiste Beaudry and Marie Louise Doyon) family sheet, #17475 – Louis Joseph's birth from his parents' (Jean François Toupin and Marie Madeleine Constantineau) family sheet; Kelley, ed., 6, 16; Denissen, I, 458, II, 794].

Bouron, age 39, born in Canada, 2 *arpents*, 2 boys, 0 girls, 1 slave, 1 hired man, comfortable. Annotations: **Charles Bouron**, son of Joseph Bouron and Marie Josèphe Boyer, was born 16 October 1722 in Laprairie. He married **Marguerite Réaume**, daughter of Pierre Réaume and Marie Estève, 7 January 1756 in Ste Anne du Détroit. She was born 3 July 1725 in Détroit. Their surviving children were Charles, Jean Baptiste, and Pierre. When Nicolas was baptized 28 February 1760, his father was described as a *habitant de la coste du Sud*. Pierre Bouron was baptized 1 June 1762 in *la Mission des hurons de la Pointe de Montréal*. The name of Charles Bouron's slave is not known [*Ste Anne Register*, image 97; *Ste Anne Register Part 2*, image 92 – Nicolas' baptism; Jetté, 154, 971; Kelley, ed., 11; Trudel, 288; Toupin, 1012; Denissen, I, 166 – gives Charles' baptismal date as his birth date].

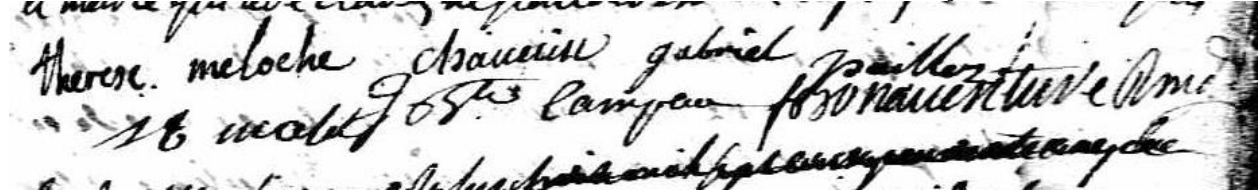

Jannisse,⁵ age 45, born in Canada, 3 *arpents*, 1 boy, 3 girls, 0 slaves, 1 hired man, comfortable. Annotations: **François Eustache Janis**, son of François Janis and Simone Brousseau, was born 14 November 1713 in Québec. He married **Thérèse Meloche**, daughter of Pierre Meloche and Jeanne Caron, 23 August 1745 in Détroit. She was born 25 February 1732 in Détroit. Their surviving children were François, Geneviève, Marie Madeleine, and Thérèse. On 11 April 1761 when Thérèse was baptized, her father was described as a *habitant de la coste des hurons* [Gail Moreau-DesHarnais, "[The François Janis Family of the Detroit River Region and the Nicolas Janis Family of Kaskaskia \(Illinois\) and Ste. Geneviève \(Missouri\): Another Example of Brothers Confused One for the Other.](#)" *MHH*, Vol. 31, # 1, January 2010, 1-5; http://habitantheritage.org/french-canadian_resources/individuals_or_families; *Ste*

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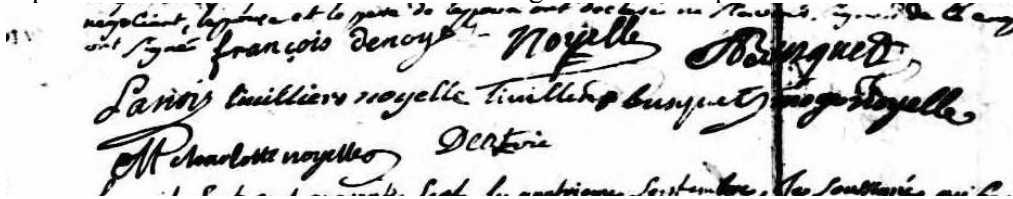

Mailloux, age 34, born in Canada, 3 *arpents*, 0 boys, 0 girls, 0 slaves, 0 hired men, comfortable. Annotations: **Joseph Mailloux**, son of Pierre Mailloux and Louise Vacher, was baptized 28 January 1725 in Beauport. He did not marry until 1765 [Jetté, 757; Denissen, II, 784-785 – gives his baptismal date as his birth date].

Denoyé, age 41, born in Canada, 3 *arpents*, 1 boy, 2 girls, 1 slave, 1 hired man, comfortable. Annotations: **François Louis Marcheteau dit Desnoyers**, son of Pierre Marcheteau *dit* Desnoyers and Marie Marguerite Pillet, was born 7 October 1719 in Montréal. He married **Marie Josèphe de Noyelles**, daughter of Nicolas Joseph de Noyelles and Marguerite Gagnon, 4 September 1747 in Montréal. She was born *circa* 1730 in New France and was an *enfant naturel*. Their surviving children were Joseph Marie, Marie Josèphe, and Marie Geneviève. On 9 July 1759 when their daughter Véronique was baptized, her father was described as a master *charpentier* and *habitan de la coste du nord* [*Ste Anne Register Part 2*, image 88 – Veronique’s baptism; Jetté, 765; *PRDH*, #25678 – François Louis Marcheteau and Marie Josèphe de Noyelle’s family sheet, #131452 – Marie Josèphe’s individual sheet which shows that she was an *enfant naturel*; Trudel, 380 – Trudel states the wife’s family name is Demarle; Denissen, I, 360 – gives François’ baptismal date as his birth date and does not give Marie Josèphe’s father’s correct name].

Delongueil,⁶ 12 *arpents*, at Montréal, rich. Annotations: **Paul Joseph Lemoine, Chevalier de Longueuil**, son of Charles Lemoine and Claude Élisabeth de Souart, was born 17 September 1701 in Longueuil. He was *commandant* in Détroit from 1743 to 1750. He married **Marie Geneviève de Joybert de Soulanges**, daughter of Pierre Jacques Joybert de Soulanges and Marie Anne Bécard, 19 October 1728 in Québec. She was born 5 October 1703 in Québec. Based on *Ste. Anne du Détroit* records, it does not appear that his wife ever came to Détroit [Jetté, 611, 711, 713; *DCB*].
