Frederick Arthur Verner was born 26 February 1836 in present-day Sheridan, Ontario. He greatly admired the paintings of Paul Kane and sought training by Kane, but Kane refused. Many of his paintings are based on sketches made when he accompanied Alexander Morris to the signing of the third Northwest Angle Treaty at Lake of the Woods in 1873. Verner moved to London in 1880, but continued to visit Canada to paint.¹
